





DR. MARIE MARMO MULLANEY has been teaching history at Caldwell University since 1980. She holds a B.A. in history and political science from Seton Hall University and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Rutgers University. She teaches a wide range of courses in European history, American history, African-American history, the history of New Jersey, the history of Hispanics in America, and women's history. In recent years, Dr. Mullaney has expanded her research interests to include the history of Catholicism. For three years, she worked with Caldwell students as campus coordinator for the Sister Story oral history project, a national project which created an online archive of the experiences of American Catholic religious sisters. From 2018-2020 she was part of a Caldwell University team that brought the St. John's Bible to the campus community. Dr. Mullaney has been a National Merit Scholar, holder of a Danforth Foundation Fellowship, and winner of a Sears-Roebuck Foundation Excellence in Teaching Award. She received the Excellence in Teaching Award from Caldwell University in 2024.



TOM'S THOUGHTS IN HURRICANE SEASON

ID YOU WIN?" I demurely laughed at the intrusion by the lottery pop-up on my phone as I was reading today's gospel from Mark to prepare for this article. (I would stick a happy face emoji here if I could). Hand to God, it came just as I read Jesus' retort to the disciples, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" I still want to win. It seems to be human nature. I tell myself that I don't have to win the millions by myself. I just would like a little bundle to provide some security, especially now that I'm retired and on a fixed income. Then I hear that lady saying to her sister in the life insurance commercial, "We're all on fixed income!" And I laugh again! I haven't named this

hurricane yet, but each day in these elder years is a challenge, a whirlwind, indeed, a HURRICANE.

Of course, HURRICANE TEVYE comes to mind, as I hum, "If I were a rich man," from "Fiddler on the Roof."

A political HURRICANE has been stirring for months now.
Candidates, one old, that is, repeated or shall I say, familiar, and the other surprisingly new and quicker to the stage than planned. No one can deny that an inequity of riches exists in our capitalistic society. If the United States were in a snow globe, maybe it would just need a good shake for the snow to settle more evenly. We have to give it the first

shake, that is, we voters. Do not take your hard-fought-for and blood-spilled right to vote for the leadership of our country for granted. May the candidates take to heart another part of today's psalm, "Let your work be seen by your servants and your glory by their children; and may the gracious care of the Lord our God be ours; prosper the work of our hands for us! Prosper the work of our hands!"

Then the news comes on and world leaders who got tired of playing "War" on board games or card games, when they were children, decidedly continue to bomb the hell out of each other.
